Nursery at Doncaster

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CEO Report

In some ways Autumn is a bit of a "business as usual" time in the garden and at KHG. That does not mean, however, that nothing has been happening. A beautiful sunny day at the end of March heralded our first Autumn Fair since 2019. This was the culmination of several week's work in the garden and hot houses to prepare. It is wonderful to be able to connect with our wider community on these occasions.

There has been some significant maintenance work happening across both sites. At Peppertree Place we have painted the kitchen space as well as had some work done on the entry way floors. We are upgrading the hot water system to the coffee cart. These are all to ensure that we are compliant with food safety regulations.

At Doncaster we have acquired and installed two new large marquees. With the installation of lighting and heaters these will provide some welcome additional undercover space for our programs through the vagaries of Melbourne winter. Regular visitors to Doncaster will also have seen the new concrete slab in the nursery. Georgia Brown reports on this exciting new development later in this newsletter...

Late last year we were fortunate enough to have a team from the Deloitte Access

Economics Education team conduct a workshop with our senior staff to work through some of the challenges that KHG faces in the current climate. Our "Beginners Horticulture" classes subsidised by ACFE have kicked off again this year and classes are being held on Monday afternoons providing our enthusiastic participants with some more in-depth horticulture training and experiences.

As KHG's Grow Coordinator, I have been busy ensuring our Grow Program runs smoothly and meets the dynamic goals and needs of our community. I've been working with all staff and participants to get a good understanding of how things are going for everyone. Their feedback is vital for guiding and informing how best to structure and implement programming as we move forward. We have ten dedicated garden beds over both sites for food production with the aim to build an understanding on growing seasonal vegetables and fruit, and to have something to take home for our participants and staff.

Patrick, our Coordinator of Therapeutic Horticulture has been working hard to review and enhance KHG's Grow Model to reflect how our multidisciplinary team delivers therapeutic horticulture. The Grow Model provides a comprehensive resource for our whole team and once reviewed, will serve to both guide and enrich work.

Outside at Doncaster, the garden looks as good as it does in spring! This is testament to our participants, volunteers and staff! Their commitment, engagement and pride in their work keeps KHG looking great all year round. With the warm weather and rains autumn has been a productive time at Peppertree Place. The gardens look spectacular with an abundance of Salvias, Anemones, Cosmos and Penstemons flowering. Inside, we've had some works in the kitchen including a fresh coat of paint, with minor plumbing works to come soon.

Participants have been getting creative and they made some striking plant displays for the KHG marquee at the Melbourne International Flower and Garden show. They have been learning new skills as they made hanging kokodamas, painted and planted out quirky picture frames with succulents and prepared interesting displays for the hanging basket competition. We are pleased to announce a participant won 6th prize for their interesting and technically difficult-to-make hanging basket display that resembled a jellyfish.

These are currently on display in our nursery which is open Mon – Fri 9 – 2.30pm and Saturday 9 – 1pm. The nursery is brimming with plants! Currently we have a beautiful array of Camellias, Salvias and Plectranthus flowering in the nursery and have a delicious selection of herbs and vegetable seedlings.

Participants have enjoyed an autumn harvest of kiwifruit, pomegranates, berries, tomatoes and malabar spinach to name a few of the many varieties of produce grown on site. In our hospitality program this produce is used to cook up delicious meals for the café. Pizza, lasagne, quiches, soups and muffins continue to be favourites amongst participants and are almost always found on the menu.

Peppertree Café is open Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday 9 – 1pm, it also serves up fantastic coffee and toasties.



Support Co-ordination

Hello everyone. I would like to introduce myself as the Lead Support Coordinator in the newly created and evolving role. I'm Michele and I have worked in the disability field for all my working life.

I started out as a Nurse; my favorite role was working in the ABI unit at Royal Talbot Rehabilitation Centre. From there I went back to further study and did a BA in Youth Affairs. I took a role with The Camping Association of Victoria as a Coordinator, training volunteers to attend mainstream camps with young people with a disability and supporting those placements. So began my love of using the great outdoors and related activities (ropes courses, horse riding, canoeing, hikes etc) to enhance and increase people's confidence and enjoyment in a natural setting. Other job roles have been with Interchange, Reach Out for Kids, Kids Helpline (as a Peer Skills Support Trainer) and most recently working in the field of ABA. (Applied Behavior Analysis). I've worked as an ABA therapist for the past 12 years, supporting young children and teenagers on the autism spectrum with their learning journey.

I live in Warranwood and I am a Mum of two boys and one rescue dog called Toby! I enjoy hiking, bike riding, kayaking, cooking, reading, yoga and gardening. I'm really looking forward to picking up gardening tips and have already learnt lots attending some of the group sessions over the past week.

The implementation of NDIS funding has made a huge difference to people with disabilities and their families. Participants can now access multiple intervention therapies and programs and more services are now in reach for more people. But the navigation around funding and NDIS plans can be quite overwhelming and difficult to negotiate.

I see my role as Support Coordinator involving spending time getting to know potential participants, understanding and clarifying goals and desired outcomes, and networking with KHG and other Service Providers to meet those desired outcomes. I look forward to being part of actively promoting this new service and participating in program evaluation. I hope to be a support and sounding board for students and support staff involved in direct care and I am excited to be part of a dynamic multidisciplinary team.



Nursery News

We've been enjoying what seems to be the last of the warm, sunny days here in our nurseries. Participants and staff spent the weeks leading up to the Autumn Fair preparing the nursery and garden for the big day. We also received very generous donations of stock from Proteaflora and Warners, Scotsburn, Oasis and Southern Plants Nursery in Dromana. Our nurseries at Doncaster and Coburg are still full of autumn colour and plenty of perennial natives and exotics that can be planted all through winter and autumn.

Both Coburg and Doncaster are wellstocked with all the KHG usual suspects – Salvias, Plectranthus and lots of perennial natives. At our Doncaster nursery we have a large number of sedums and kalanchoes amongst our succulents, as well as large established Furcraeas (which do well in similar conditions to succulents). For different coloured foliage we have healthy established stock of centradenias (redburgundy), Swedish Ivy (green with white variegation), variegated buxus (white variegated), French and English lavenders (light green-grey), Old-Man Saltbush (green-gray), Bromeliads (light green or dark grey-green), and Canna Lilies (red

variegated), French and English lavenders (light green-grey), Old-Man Saltbush (green-gray), Bromeliads (light green or dark grey-green), and Canna Lilies (red and green). For nice flowering plants we have abelias, liriope muscari, Jerusalem Sage, Pelargonium striatellum 'Edna Walling', various other pelargoniums, osteospermums, penstemons, Passionfruit Marigolds, white flowering Camelia sasanguas and abutilons (yellow and red). Amongst our natives we have established 6-12" pots of hakeas, prostanthera sieberi (native mint bush), and acacias. If you wander into our hothouse you will also see our selection of indoor plants.

At Coburg there's a number of winter veg, indoor plants in hanging baskets and small pots, some smaller native saplings and lots of groundcovers. Are you looking to add a therapeutic element to your garden by using some sensory plants? Both nurseries have a thriving selection of plants with one or more distinct sensory characteristics such as smell, texture or colour. These include scented pelargoniums (AKA geraniums), and my perpetual favourite Passionfruit marigolds (Tagetes lemonii).

Seasonal Recipe

Both Peppertree Place and Doncaster sites have been harvesting an abundance of Jerusalem Artichokes! Unbeknowst to most, they are actually a variety of sunflower and high in iron.

We have loved this recipe, which brings out their sweet and nutty flavour.

Jerusalem Artichoke Soup

4 to 6 servings

Ingredients

¼ cup extra-virgin olive oil

1 leek, white and pale green parts, rinsed and finely chopped

½ cup finely chopped white onion

900grams Jerusalem artichokes, peeled and rinsed

5 cups water or vegetable stock

1 teaspoon sea salt

Method

Step 1

Heat the olive oil in a soup pot over medium heat. Add the leek and onion and sauté until softened, about 5 minutes.

Add the Jerusalem artichokes, water and salt and bring to a boil. Decrease the heat, cover and simmer until the artichokes are tender, about 30 minutes.

Step 2

Remove from the heat and let cool. Transfer the mixture to a blender and process until smooth. Taste and adjust the seasonings if necessary. Gently reheat before serving.

Step 3

To crisp the sage leaves, heat the olive oil in a small sauté pan over medium heat.

Add the sage leaves and sauté until just crisp, about 2 minutes. Drain on paper towels. Garnish each serving with a couple of the sage leaves.


Playing Our Part
